The third day of our trip we went to Blinman Pools an hour away. We found rocky river beds leading to pools and waterfalls, we played around throwing rocks in the water, catching yabbies and finding crystals. Everyone had lots of fun as there was so much to do and it was so beautiful. That night we had banana splits for dessert, this was the best!!!

On our final day at the Flinders Rangers we had hash browns, cereal and toast for breakfast. We packed up our tents and swags and hit the road. Then we had the long trip home. We left at 9am and watched movies, everyone was tired but it really was the best camp ever!










