100 DAYS OF SCHOOL







On Wednesday of Week 1, Term 3, the Receptions in Mrs Allsop, Ms Dale and Mrs Kelly/Mrs Mumford's classes celebrated 100 days of being at school.

This year we had students dress up as 100 year old people, children 100 years ago, people in the war and also people wearing 100 things such as buttons. Students also participated in a range of literacy and numeracy activities based on the theme of 100. We wrote about being 100 years old and what would they like or not like of 100 something. Examples included: eating 100 cupcakes but not have 100 snakes or trees in their house. They would like to give 100 houses to the people who don't have a home.

Other activities were making 100 days at school crowns, stacking 100 cups and timing ourselves to see how much we can do in 100 seconds. Mrs Allsop's class made an array of 100 M & M's. We made each group of ten of one colour and then recorded our findings. We found out that 10 groups of 10 equals 100. We practised counting in tens in ones and tens. We danced to the 100 song and had so much fun. This week Mrs Allsop's class is going to draw a self portrait of what we will look like when we are 100 years old!

We will continue to count the days at school. In Mrs Allsop's class we are using popsticks and containers to count the days. We have moved the 100 popstick bundle into the Hundreds jar and today (being day 101) we added one popstick into our Ones container. This has been a great idea for showing children what 100 looks like. We have also made a display in our classroom. The display shows how many ways we can make 100. We have zippy bags filled with popcorn kernels, rice, coins, paper, lego, buttons and marshmallows, just to name a few.


There is also the SMS service for absent students available on 0418 126 935 every day.

PARKING AROUND ALEXANDRINA

Alexandrina Council Community Safety Officers will be commencing regular patrols of school zones over the next few weeks and continuing throughout the school year.

Due to safety reasons evidence of vehicles breaching the Australian Road Rules are obtained using vehicle dash cam footage and Expiations issued via post.

Patrols are done at the request of the public and are supported by most schools to improve the safety of pedestrians and road users alike.

Common Offences AVOID THE FINE... READ THE SIGNS:

NATURE OF OFFENCE	PENALTY
Parking for longer than indicated (timed parking)	\$58
Failing to park in road related area (verge)	\$72
Parking against the flow of traffic	\$75
Stopping where no parking sign applies	\$89
Stopping in, on or across a driveway	\$89
Stopping where no stopping sign applies	\$106
Double parking	\$106
Stopping on or near a children's crossing	\$106
Stopping on road with continuous yellow line	\$108
Stopping on, path, dividing strip or nature strip	\$108
Stopping in a bus zone	\$146

No Stopping Zones

Australian Road Rule 167

A vehicle must not stop in an area where a no stopping sign is placed even if you are only letting someone out of the car and regardless of whether you leave the engine running and stay in the car.



These are usually installed in areas that need clear sight for safety reasons such as crossings and schools.

No Parking Zones

Australium Road Rule 168

There is a two-minute passenger loading limit on a no parking zone. The driver cannot leave the vehicle unattended unless the driver is within three metres of the vehicle and must move on within two minutes after stopping.



These zones are generally around schools and the idea of them is a 'kiss and drop'.

Yellow Lines

Australian Road Rule 169

You must not park your vehicle, even partially on a yellow line.

Double Parking

Australian Road Rule 189

A driver must not stop on the road next to a parked vehicle.



Crossings

You may not park or stop within 20 metres coming into a chil-

dren crossing or within 10 metres exiting a children crossing.

A driver must not stop on a



level crossing, or on a road within 20 metres before the nearest rail or track to the driver approaching the crossing and 20 metres after the nearest rail or track

Permissive Parking

to the driver leaving the crossing.

Australian Road Rule 205

Drivers are only allowed to park & not exceed the time period indicated on the sign. Permissive park

ing signs are used to help with the regular turn over of vehicles so that more people get a chance to park. These signs usually show the times and days to which these restrictions apply.

Driveways

Australian Road Rule 198 (2)

You must not park your vehicle on or across a driveway, even if this driveway is to your own

property. You are allowed to stop across a driveway only if you are dropping off, or picking up passengers and do not leave the vehicle unattended and complete the dropping off, or picking up within a minutes of stopping.

Parking on the Council Verge

(Nature Strip)

Australian Road Rules no. 197 (1)

For the safety of pedestrians, and to not cause property damage to the environment, you must not park even partially on footpaths or the nature strip.



Expiration notices will be given to vehicles that park on the Council Verge.

Bus Zone

Road Rule 195

You must not stop your vehicle in ar area that is

indicated as a bus zone



Community Safety Officers will be doing patrols throughout the year in particular at school zones to re-enforce correct parking.

PARKING AROUND ALEXANDRINA



Dear parents, guardians and carers

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information.
